Kindergarten

Kindergarten classrooms continue to be joyful places of friendship and learning. Students have begun to explore animal habitats and needs. Centers are transforming into these habitats and texts are being read aloud providing new learning. Students will explore habitats including their own backyards, the grasslands, the ocean, the farm and Antarctica. This is always a favorite of our science



explorations.

Literacy learning has shifted from identifying letters sounds to tapping and blending these sounds to read words. Trick words (sight words) are being introduced. Our early literacy skills are blooming! Math skills will continue to focus on addition and subtraction concepts and building fact fluency. Kindergarten students have been working on building up concrete under-

standing of these concepts through numerous hands on games. Our classrooms are fortunate to have a large variety of materials to support hands on learning. Fluency of math facts within five will become part of our daily practice.

Exciting things are happening in kindergarten!



Grade 1

Happy March! We can't believe it is already the end of the second trimester! We have been very busy learning new things and engaging in fun and exciting activities. First, we would like to thank you for all of your help in celebrating the 100th day of school and Valentine's Day. The children had a fun and memorable week celebrating!

In Science and Social Studies, we have been learning about the Earth, Sun, and Moon, Martin Luther King, Jr., Timelines, and Presidents' Day. Thank you so much for helping your child with their timeline. The students did a wonderful job presenting their timelines to their classmates. We could not have done this activity without all of your help!

In Math, we will be continuing to work on math facts to 20, with addition and subtraction fluency to 10. Please continue to work on these facts at home with your child. The more they practice, the more fluent they will become.

In Reading, we are working on listening to a story and discussing story elements, such as characters, setting, plot, theme, and main idea. The children are also working on their reading fluency. In our Foundations program, they will be learning new phonics rules to help them read new words. Our writing theme is "How To"; steps to make or do something. You can help at home by letting your child cook with you, have them explain how to play their favorite game,

have them teach a younger sibling or friend how to do an activity, game, or play a sport. In class, we have worked on writing the steps to build a snowman, make hot chocolate or chocolate milk, how to brush their teeth, and many others. This has been a fun writing theme. Please continue to read each night with your child.

As always, we want to thank you for your continued support in helping your child practice their reading, writing, and math skills. The parent/teacher team is very important in ensuring your child's success and just as importantly, their love of learning.

We hope that you all have a wonderful SPRING!

The First Grade Team



Grade 2



It is amazing to know that second trimester is already coming to a close. With vacations, snow days, delays, early releases, testing, and sicknesses, it has been a struggle to develop and maintain a routine; however, we have worked hard and accomplished so much!

Early in the trimester we worked on expanding our skills with maps and globes. After using maps to track the journey of Columbus and the Pilgrims we were able to use maps to help us "travel" around the world as we explored the holiday customs in other countries and cultures. In January, we began a new science topic. The focus of this topic was the changing Earth. We discovered different types of landforms and how land changes shape over time. We were introduced to the concepts of weathering and erosion, and identified if different things that changed the Earth happened quickly or slowly.



In reading, we were introducing two new skills: drawing conclusions, and cause and effect. We also spent time focusing on non-fiction reading skills, including comparing/contrasting, fact and opinion, and reading for details. We continue to expand our phonics skills, working especially hard on long vowel sounds and the many ways to spell them.

In writing, students are applying their spelling and grammar skills. They are adding more interesting verbs and exploring how to use adjectives to create images in their readers' minds. We still continue to develop narrative writing skills, but have also shifted our focus to informational writing. Students loved writing "how to" pieces, and even tried their hands at nonfiction writing about a variety of topics.

In math, second graders have been working on addition and subtraction strategies, including addition and subtraction with regrouping. These can be tricky skills, but they are so important for students to master, so we spend plenty of time practicing. We also began working on place value skills up to 1,000. This involves patterns, the value of different digits in a number, ordering numbers, and using the greater than and less than symbols to compare numbers. Keep working on math facts. Remember, there are great apps and websites to help, including Xtramath.org. We are looking forward to an exciting third trimester ahead!



Grade 3

The last two months have been packed with learning for the third grade students. In science they explored forces and motion, and learned about weather extremes. Thanks to Mother Nature, students experienced firsthand some extremes, snow one day and temperatures in the 70's a few days later. In math, students studied multiplication and division and will learn



about fractions after vacation. It is important that students become fluent in their multiplication and division facts through the tens. Please help your children master these facts. We have focused on informational writing. Initially we started with

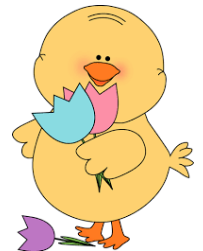
“How to Essays”, but most recently we have examined the techniques needed to compose informational paragraphs. The third grade team looks forward to the spring, as well as, the continued growth and achievements of your sons and daughters. Happy Spring!

Grade 4

It's hard to believe how fast this year is speeding by, but as the old saying goes... time flies when you're having fun! In fourth grade, we are working hard, but we're having fun while we're learning. Students recently wrapped up their biography reports and presented information to their classmates all about a famous American's life and their contributions to our country. They learned how to research information online, take notes, write and organize an informational report and also how to create a timeline. In Reading, we learned all about first and second point of view in a fictional text and how to identify the au-

thor's point of view in a nonfiction text. Who knew that authors could be so opinionated and persuasive in their writing? During Math class the fourth graders have learned so many challenging concepts this trimester including double-digit multiplication, long division and even a little algebra. Ask your student to demonstrate some of their magic mathematical skills. We're sure that you'll be amazed! Science brought studies in Earth Science. We learned all about natural disasters, rocks, and changes to Earth's surface. Recently the fourth grade students began a Social Studies Unit all about government. We're now in the midst of learning all about the three branches of our nation-

al, state, and local government as well as how a bill becomes a law. Don't be surprised when your child comes home singing the old Schoolhouse Rock song, "I'm Just a Bill!" Please remember to contact your teacher with any questions or concerns you may have about what's going on in your child's classroom. We are your partners in education and always appreciate your help and support at home. Thanks for all that you do! Happy spring... it's almost here!



Grade 5

The 2nd trimester found us really expanding into our studies. In Reading, all classrooms continued to discover the Wonders our new Reading series has to offer. Students continued to develop their skills in fluency, vocabulary, literary and informational comprehension, while teachers continued to share with each other all the activities and instructional methods they are using in their classrooms. All classrooms read *No Talking* and *Wonder*, leading to some very thought provoking conversations. Just before February vacation, all students had the opportunity to view the movie *Wonder*, and compare the content of the movie to that of the book. In Math, all students continued to develop their skills in fluency, problem solving, and concepts and applications; recalling that specific topics have varied, as there are three different math programs being used throughout the grade level. In Science, all students participated in hands-on activities and research gathering experiences related to Earth Science. Finally, in Social Studies, all students began their studies of US History, covering content from the



early explorers to the establishment of the 13 colonies.

Our Lead to Succeed program exposed students to two units this trimester - Goal Setting and New Year New You - Looking Beyond Ourselves. Students were introduced to data analysis, goal planning, measurement, and designing academic plans to meet the needs of their goals. Students were also introduced to several pieces of literature to build skills in kindness, empathy, sympathy, and perseverance. Students participated in 2 Kindness Counts activities this trimester - hosting local veterans for a luncheon and collecting toys for our annual Toys for Tots Drive. Our mentors from Enterprise Bank were introduced to the students, and have had several visits to their classrooms, along with scooping 175 bowls of ice cream for our Sundae School Valentine's Day celebration. Finally, during our weekly meetings, we continued to celebrate the amazing student growth demonstrated on monthly

iReady testing.

Last, but not least, beginning the second week of January, we opened our classrooms to the Pelham Police Department to begin their 10-week DARE program. Officer Kelly will be instructing Miss Hebert's, Mrs. Philcrantz's, and Mrs. Zidek's classrooms. Officer Yates returns to Mrs. Roberson's and Mrs. Struth's classrooms. Officer Huertas, a new DARE officer, has joined Mr. Harris's and Mrs. Maguire's classrooms. Students will be developing a concrete understanding of the DARE decision-making model and using this model to help them make good decisions when faced with difficult situations. We look forward to celebrating the achievements of our students at DARE graduation with their families and the community later in March!



Unified Arts



Despite the cold and snowy winter...the Media Center has been a very busy place! Grade 1 has been reading and learning the difference between Fiction and Nonfiction books. They are now exploring the Easy Nonfiction section of the library and they're doing a fabulous job! Grade 2 has completed library review and have been learning about the genre Biography. They are working hard at learning to navigate their way onto our digital library Destiny. Once they've mastered this skill they'll begin learning how nonfiction books are shelved and how to locate them throughout our leveled reader section. Grade 3 successfully completed their Read Through Yoga Unit and what an incredible job they did. This unit was a Health/Library lesson which was completed with Ms. DiRenzo. They are now beginning a unit on research skills and exploring how to research through text books and safe search engines such as Grolier. Grade 4 and 5 have mastered Digital Citizenship. Plagiarism, Paraphrasing, and MLA citations were covered in this unit. Grade 4 has also created digital My Create Lego stories while grade 5 completed a fun filled unit on Personalized Learning Research followed up with slideshows. Please note that our Scholastic Book Fair will take place March 12th - 16th. Students will visit the book fair during their scheduled library unified art class. We will also be hosting a Family Book Fair Night on March 16th from 6 - 8 p.m. in the Media Center. 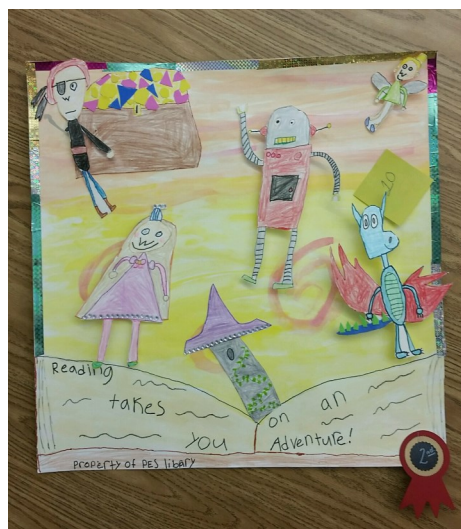
