Science

Science is divided into three primary areas; Life, Earth & Space, and Physical. In Kindergarten the units of study are integrated into their reading units or daily calendar activities.

Units covered include:

- Weather
- Animal, Plants and their Environments
- Force and Interactions

Through these units, students will gain content knowledge as well as an understanding of the following:

- How is the weather different today than yesterday?
- How does knowing the weather forecast help people?
- How does the sun change the Earth?
- What do animals (including humans) and plants need to survive?
- How do animals (including humans) and plants grow and change?
- How can humans keep animal/plant habitats healthy?
- How does applying push/pull affect the movement of an object?
- How can you speed up the movement of an object using push/pull?



Social Studies

Social Studies is divided into four strands; civics and government, economics, geography, and history. In Kindergarten, these strands are integrated into the reading units and daily classroom activities.

Units covered include:

- Communities
- Maps/Globes
- Holidays
- Patriotism

Through these units students will gain content knowledge as well as an understanding of the following:

- How do people in a community help one another?
- How is money used within a community?
- Where are we on a map?
- What are our national holidays? Why/how are they celebrated?
- What are some of our patriotic symbols?

Mathematics

In Kindergarten, instructional time will focus on two critical areas: (1) counting objects to tell how many there are followed by addition and subtraction of small numbers; (2) describing shapes. Additional time will be spent on the following skills and understandings:

- Know number names and count in sequence.
- Count to tell the number of objects.
- Compare numbers; greater than and less than.

• Understand addition as putting together and adding to, and understand subtraction as taking apart and taking from; work with word problems that ask for addition or subtraction



English Language Arts

English Language Arts (ELA) comprises four areas; reading, writing, language, and speaking & listening. Within these four areas there are many categories, which when all brought together encompass student literacy.

In Kindergarten, these are the skills and understandings we focus on in each area:

Reading

- Name letters and match them to the sound(s) they make.
- Break apart words into sounds, build words from individual sounds
- Comprehend text that is read aloud; identify the topic and one or two details in informational text, identify the setting, characters, and on or two events in literature.

Writing

- Use a combination of drawing, dictating and writing to state an opinion or preference, express feelings and emotions, share information and tell stories.
- Spell words by building from the individual sounds as well as properly spell the smaller words used frequently in our language (e.g. a, the, to, of, from, I, is, are).

Language

- Print letters using proper formation (all uppercase and many lower case).
- Use proper grammar when speaking and writing; matching plurals and verb tense.

- Use a variety of words for the same or similar meaning (e.g. big, giant, huge, large).
- Understand that a sentence starts with a capital and ends with a punctuation mark.

Speaking & Listening

- Participate in conversations and learning exchanges using agreed-upon rules; take turns, raise your hand, wait to be called on, listen to others, etc.
- Ask and answer questions in order to seek help, get information, or clarify something that is confusing.
- Describe familiar people, places and events and one or two events in literature.
